Why Pakistan?

Country profile:

Language: Urdu (national) & English (official), other 120 languages of them Punjabi, Sindhi & Pachtoun are important.

Population: 207 millions (2017)

People: Punjabi (44 %), Pashthun (15%)

Sindhi (14%)


Religion: Sunni Muslim (96%)

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Language status and its role for Pakistanis

In Pakistan

- Urdu > 8% speakers. National language.
 Widely spread on TV, Radio, Press.
 Language of Prestige & Elite. Taught in schools & University.
- Punjabi > 44% speakers. Widespread particularly in the Punjab province. Not taught not at school nor at University level. Language attitude not positive.
- English > Compulsory in school.
- French > Compulsory in school and university.

In France

- Urdu > Parents speak to their children but speaks Punjabi or other languages among themselves. Exam subject in 12th grade. Teaching at university level.
- Punjabi > Language practiced among parents and less transmitted to their children. Not taught in France.
- French > Second-generation and forth on are enrolled in French public school.
- English > Competency is not adequate. Compulsory subject from



Profile of Pakistani migrants in France

Asylum Seekers

- Age : 18-55 mostly
- Who are they? Any one who fears of being persecuted for reasons related to religion, nationality, race, political opinion or membership of a social group.
- Mostly are for economic reasons too. (Kriger-Krynicki 1989)
- Education: No schooling, little bit of schooling, Madarsa or under X class
- Languages : Punjabi, Urdu, Pashtoun, Baloch, English

Minor isolated children

- Age: under 18. As young as 13 or 14 years.
- Who are they? Minor children given to traffickers. Parents are told that their children will be taken care by French govt. Minor migration for better life.
- Mostly for economic reasons but some file the demand for asylum later.
- Education : No schooling, little bit of schooling or up to class VIII
- Languages : Punjabi, Urdu, other regional languages, English

Family reunification

- Age: Between 18-25
- Who are they ? Mostly married women whose huband migrated to France for economic or asylum purposes. They may be also husband or children.
- Reasons: To reunite with spouse.
- Education: No schooling, little bit of schooling or up to graduation.
- Languages: Punjabi, Urdu, other regional languages, English.

Urdu

- ❖ National language, national identity
- Important for unity
- ❖ Vehicular language for Pakistan
- Developed language.
- Many literary works
- No career prospects without English
- Limited to Pakistan only
- No scientific or humanities teaching at higher level

Punjabi

- Identification with the mother tongue
- To understand the ancestral heritage
- To know the culture, literature and works of sufi poets
- No career prospects
- Not linked to development
- It will ruin my Urdu pronunciation
- Impolite, barbaric and rural language

Language attitudes among migrants from Pakistan

Asylum Seekers (AS)

- Language become the source of identity and personal development
- Urdu is associated with the positive attitude
- Demand of Urdu interpreters even if Urdu is not the mother tongue
- Punjabi is chosen by uneducated AS
- Choice of language depends upon the story

Inalco Urdu students

- Urdu is privileged among communication with the professors
- French remain the language of communication among peers
- Punjabi identity is hidden
- Students report that they speak only in Urdu in home whereas the parents speak in Punjabi

Status of Urdu in France

- Considered as a "rare language" in France.
- High demand in the translation of documents and interpretations in organisms
- Important language for French researchers focusing on India and Pakistan
- Important language for military personnel and staffs in Embassies if working with India or Pakistan
- Urdu in Hindustani form was taught as language since 1828 in Inalco, formerly known as Ecole speciale des langues orientales.
- Garcin de Tassy (1794-1878) was the first Hindustani professor. An orientalist & expert of Hindustani language.
- He has published over 20 works on Hindustani language.
- André Guimbretières was officially the first professor of Urdu in 1962.
- Urdu is an optional subject for Twelfth grade. Only exams are allowed.
- Exam Copies are checked by Urdu professors of Inalco.

Language and identity

- Sociolinguistics of mobility
- Identity stress versus identity crisis

Case of Pakistani second-generations

- · Affinity with own culture
- Consumption of Pakistani TV serials in home in Urdu
- Punjabi dramas on Youtube or TV channels
- Do not want to identify themselves only with France
- Regional identity & religious identity (Abou-Zahab 2007)
- > Punjabi, Mujahir etc & Sunni, Shia, Ahmadi etc.
- Discrimination in jobs
- Arrange marriage
- Sense of duty toward Pakistanis who are not migrated
- · Islamic identity & Pakistani identity
 - · Detached with the national French identity debate
 - Not feel represented by the French Council of Muslims
 - Pakistani Islam marked by ethnicity (Abou-Zahab 2007)
